Every fifth round he played during last year, Tom Higgins entered a number equal to or lower than his age (which was 79 until November 25) on his Ironwood CC scorecard, according to head professional Mike Oberlander. The retired aerospace executive has been an Ironwood member since 1979 and has played the game since he was eight. His best score among the 72 rounds over that stretch was 71 on the North Course (which he favors) last summer (a week later he shot 72).

■ Brendan Steele established a course record at Seven Hills GC in Hemet by shooting a 30-31—61 in January. And he did it with a double bogey five at No. 2 thrown in. To offset that slip, Steele had six birdies and an aple at the 495-yard ninth hole for a 30 on the front, , then came back with five birdies on the back side.

• In January/February's compilation of scores for the SCGA Tournament of Club Champions (pages 12-13), Gerald Zar's score at Dove Canyon in the Championship was incorrectly reported. He shot 77. At Rolling Hills CC's Vice President's flight, John Usilton's

score was inadvertently omitted. He shot 83.

- On page T11 of the 2003 Tournament Package, the dates for the Temecula Valley City Championship event were incorrect. Dates are July 26-27.
