Re: Expectations For Schools, Coaches And Student-Athletes In Pursuing Victory With Honor_{sm}

The CIF was formed during the 1914-15 school year with 65,000 high school students in California and less than 8,000 students participating on their high school teams. Today, there are over 1.8 million high school students with more than 830,000 participating for their school teams including an all-time high of 354,265 girls. Education-based athletics will continue to thrive because of the life lessons it imparts on our young people.

Several years ago, the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) launched the #MyReasonWhy campaign. The intent behind it was to demonstrate why we (student-athletes, coaches, administrators, parents and fans) are all involved in high school sports. Recently, the CIF resurrected this campaign to once again demonstrate the real reasons why education-based athletics is so impactful on our lives. Our 10 Section Offices communicated with our member schools asking them to have their student-athletes, coaches and administrators post on various social media platforms #MyReasonWhy. We encourage you to watch/read some of these and to post your own. Whether you are a student-athlete, or coach, parent or administrator, official or fan, we all have our reason why.

It is no secret that our student-athletes are inherently drawn to sport because it is fun and because of the connection it develops between them and their peers, coaches and school community. It is human nature to want to feel part of something bigger than yourself and to find a place where you belong. Do our young people also want to compete and win? Absolutely and that will always be a part of sport. However, the adults have to start asking the question, how far do we go to win a game? Do we sacrifice life lessons such as accountability, respect, fairness and loyalty? In looking at the current landscape of high school sports, some would say that we have already gone down this path. I disagree and the examples of the #MyReasonWhy responses that we have seen to this point and hopefully continue to see certainly demonstrate that the majority of those in our 1,606 school communities are involved for the right reasons. We need to put these examples forward of what it means to be part of the high school sports community in California.

Indeed, we occasionally see acts of poor sportsmanship and behavior by a player or a coach, but the overwhelming majority of school contests reflect the positive elements of Pursuing Victory with Honor_{sm}. True, the goal is always to win the contest, but education-based athletics, when done correctly, places the value of life lessons, character and sportsmanship ahead of winning. It is this ability of education-based sports leaders to keep athletics in its proper perspective that helps separate us from the rest.

It is vital that as parents, fans and education-based sports leaders that we remember that less than 2% of our participating students will go on and compete in college athletics. Kids participate in sports because it's fun. The athletic fields, gymnasiums and classrooms our schools provide allows adults the opportunity to teach valuable lessons that might not be learned in any other environment. Creating life-long skills and helping create better citizens through participation in education-based athletics is the greatest gift we can give to the future.

Ten years from now, many of our student-athletes will return to their high school campuses for their class reunions. The majority of them will not talk about the championships that they won or their individual accolades but the journey they went on with their teammates, coaches and school communities. They will share stories and memories of their high school experiences. – the bus rides and comradery. We, as the adults, have the power to influence these future stories. We can transform the lives of young people so that one day they show up to their reunion to relive these stories with teammates and coaches. They return as the adults ready to show the next generation the true meaning of high school sports – the lifelong friends and the connections created with an entire community of support.

NOTIFICATION OF QUALIFIERS: All entries must be submitted to the SCGA office via email, by Friday, June 11, 2021 to Matt Pawlak: mpawlak@scga.org (EARLIER SECTIONS PLEASE EMAIL ASAP) Commissioners will be responsible for submitting the entries.

TUESDAY MORNING REGISTRATION: Upon arrival on June 15, coaches will be responsible for registering their team or individual player(s) at the registration table, which will be located just outside the entrance to the clubhouse. The registration table will open at 6:30 a.m. Each player must be accompanied by a coach or authorized school representative when registering at the tournament site.

<u>ALTERNATES/SUBSTITUTIONS</u>: Each CIF Section shall be responsible for designating substitutes in the event of any cancellations. A vacancy may be filled only by the next qualified substitute from the particular section involved, upon authorization from the CIF Section Commissioner. Substitutions on the day of the tournament, for the individual competitions will not be permitted. Alternates *are not* to show up *as a standby* the day of competition. Substitutes will be paired in the same position in the team pairings as the players they have replaced.

PAIRINGS & TEE TIMES: Pairings and tee times will be posted online at <u>scga.org/girlscif</u> and the CIF website <u>cifstate.org</u> on Monday, June 14 by 5 p.m. All players participating in the championship must report to the 1st hole at least 10 minutes prior to their tee time.

<u>DRESS REQUIREMENTS</u>: *Players and Coaches* must be attired in collared golf shirts (mock golf shirts are allowed as are golf shirts without collars with sleeves), slacks, or shorts, skirts or skorts no shorter than mid-thigh. Players and coaches must wear soft spiked shoes. T-SHIRTS, TANK TOPS, JEANS (denim) OF ANY COLOR OR ANY TYPE WILL NOT BE PERMITTED.

PRACTICE ROUNDS: CIF Bylaw 504.M. Sunday Restrictions are still in effect. Contact Brookside Golf Club in advance to book a practice round. The junior green fee rate is \$7 after 12:00 p.m. on Monday, June 14. Please identify yourself as a participant of the championship. Normal rates will apply for practice rounds on any other day.

RULES: Play is governed by the Rules of Golf, effective January 2019. Local Rules which apply during the tournament will be distributed to all contestants when they arrive at their starting tee. Each player understands and agrees to observe all regulations and conditions set forth by the SCGA Tournament Committee. Any questions shall be settled by the SCGA Tournament Committee whose decision shall be final.

COACHING: Limited communication between designated coach(es) and player(s) is permitted according to the rules stipulated in Rule 24.4. All coaches are required to sign and submit at the event a copy of these rules indicating that they have read and understand the rules. Other than this limited communication, Rule 8 (Advice - see section immediately below) from the Rules of Golf applies.

<u>SPECTATORS</u>: Due to current health restrictions in the City of Pasadena spectators will <u>not be allowed</u>. All spectators can vew live scoring at <u>scga.org/girlscif</u>.

<u>ADVICE</u>: Participants are reminded of Rule 10.2 (Advice) of The Rules of Golf which specifically prohibits players from receiving any counsel or suggestion from anyone, (including their parents, coaches and other players, etc.) which could influence them in determining their play, the choice of a club, or the method of making a stroke. Note: Information on the Rules of Golf, distances to a hole location, and Local Rules for this tournament are not considered to be advice.

TEEING GROUND YARDAGES: Play for the individual and team competition will be from a combo yardage. For exact hole by hole yardages please refer to the yardage locations page found below in this document.

TOURNAMENT FORMAT:

INDIVIDUAL COMPETITION:

124 players will play 18 holes of stroke play. All girls who have qualified for the individual competition or student team in their respective CIF sectional play-offs shall be eligible to compete in this category.

TIES:

In the event of a tie for 1st place of the individual championship, a hole-by-hole playoff will be conducted to determine the champion. All other ties will be broken using the USGA suggested method of matching scorecards (<u>Committee Procedures: Section 5A (6)</u>).

TEAM COMPETITION:

The teams representing each CIF Section will consist of six players, and the best five of the six players' scores will be counted in determining the team champion and runner-up and third place. All teams that have qualified in their respective CIF sectional play-offs shall be eligible to compete in this category.

TIES:

In the event of a tie in team championship, the tie will be decided by totaling the 6th person's score to the team total. If the teams are still tied the tie will be broken by using the USGA suggested method of matching scorecards (<u>Committee Procedures: Section 5A (6)</u>), which totals the scores of all six players on each team for holes 10-18, if still tied holes 13-18, if still tied holes 16-18 and if still tied hole 18. Note: if after this procedure, they are still tied, the same procedure will be used with holes 1-9.

<u>AWARDS</u>: Team awards will be presented to the champion and runner-up teams following completion of play. Awards will be presented to the first six place finishers in the individual competition. The SCGA will present awards to the top individual qualifier and everyone on the 1st place qualifying team. The award ceremony will take place on the patio outside of the clubhouse.

BROOKSIDE GENERAL INFORMATION

DRIVING RANGE: The driving range will open at 6:30 a.m. and practice balls will be available on the driving range hosted by the SCGA.

FOOD: The clubhouse will open at 6:30 a.m. for grab and go items only. Lunch service will be available beginning at 11:00 a.m. Players and coaches may purchase items from the clubhouse patio or from the BBQ stand on the South Patio near the 1st tee of Course #1. Due to gathering restrictions there will be not be a banquet hosted this year after the round as in previous years.

<u>GOLF CARTS AND CADDIES</u>. Players must carry their own clubs during the stipulated round. Caddies and golf carts are not allowed during play. Push or pull carts are permitted. Coaches and media are not allowed in golf carts.

GALLERY/SPECTATORS REQUIREMENTS: Due to current health and safety orders in the City of Pasadena and at Brookside GC – <u>spectators are not allowed</u>. All spectators can view live scoring at <u>scga.org/girlscif.</u>

DISTANCE MEASURING DEVICES: Players may obtain distance information by use of a distancemeasuring device. If, during a stipulated round, a player uses a distance-measuring device to gauge or measure other conditions that might affect his play (e.g. elevation changes, wind speed, etc.), the player is in breach of Rule 4.3a(1). Any questions about such devices should be resolved before the start of the stipulated round.

The penalty for breach of this rule is a 2-stroke penalty, any subsequent offense is disqualification.

CELLULAR PHONES

The use of wireless handheld devices (smart phones) on the golf course is <u>prohibited</u> by players. Coaches will be allowed to text, email or view live scoring on <u>scga.org/girlscif</u>. Talking on a cell phones is prohibited on the golf course. All coaches should turn their cell phones off or to silent mode.

CONDITIONS OF COMPETITION

OUT OF BOUNDS – Defined by the line between the course-side points, at ground level, of white stakes and fence posts.

PENALTY AREAS – When a penalty area is defined on only one side, it extends to infinity. When a penalty area is connected to the out of bounds, the penalty area extends to and coincides with out of bounds.

GROUND UNDER REPAIR – Defined by white lines. French drains are ground under repair.

RELIEF FROM SEAMS OF CUT TURF (SOD SEAMS) – Local Rule as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect. <u>Model Local Rule F-7</u>.

AERATION HOLES – The Local Rule as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect. <u>Model Local Rule E-4</u>.

EDGING GROOVES – The Local Rule as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect. <u>Model Local Rule F-19</u>.

WHITE-LINED AREAS TYING INTO ARTIFICIALLY-SURFACED ROADS AND PATHS – White-lined areas of ground under repair and the artificially surfaced roads, paths, or other identified obstructions that they are connected to are a single abnormal course condition when taking relief under <u>Rule 16.1</u>.

WOOD CHIPS AND MULCH - Are loose impediments.

INTEGRAL OBJECTS – Include artificial walls and pilings when located in penalty areas and bunkers.

LIST OF CONFORMING DRIVER HEADS – Local Rule as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect. <u>Model Local Rule G-1</u>.

BROKEN OR SIGNIFICANTLY DAMAGED CLUB – Model Local Rule G-9 is in effect.

STOPPING AND RESUMING PLAY – Local Rule as prescribed in Section 8 of the committee Procedures is in effect. <u>Model Local Rule J-1</u>.

BACK ON THE LINE RELIEF – Local Rule as prescribed in the Clarifications to the 2019 Rules of Golf is in effect. <u>Model Local Rule E-12</u>.

PRACTICE – Prior to and after a round in stroke play, a player may practice on the designated practice areas. Rule 5.2b covering practice in stroke play is modified in this way: A player may not practice on the competition course before or between rounds. Penalty for breach of Local Rule – 1st breach is General Penalty applied to the player's first hole. Penalty for 2nd breach – Disqualification.

WHEN COMPETITION IS FINAL – A competition is deemed to have closed when the result (including the result of a playoff, if applicable) has been officially announced or, in stroke play qualifying followed by

match play, when the player has teed off in his/her first match.

CODE OF CONDUCT – By submitting an entry for any SCGA-administered competition, the contestant understands that his/her participation is at the sole discretion of the SCGA. A contestant may be removed from any competition at the discretion of the SCGA staff or Rules and Competitions Committee at any time before or during the competition. Incidents of unbecoming conduct or actions deemed to be detrimental to the image of the SCGA or the "Spirit of the Game" are grounds for such removal and suspension from future SCGA-administered competitions. These include, but are not limited to the following: 1) Willful damage of the golf course or golf course property 2) Club throwing or unnecessary club tossing 3) Offensive or unbecoming language 4) Public criticism of golf course or verbal abuse of SCGA staff, officials, volunteers, host club staff or other contestants 5) Potential endangerment of others and 6) Conduct deemed unbecoming.

PACE OF PLAY POLICY SUMMARY – The responsibility for maintaining a good pace of play belongs with you, the player. If you fall behind on one hole, you are expected to play efficient golf and get back into position. This might mean playing ready golf for a hole or two and doing continuous putting – both of which are allowed in stroke play. Manage your time efficiently in between shots and be ready to play when it is your turn. Determine club selection and yardage while others are playing rather than waiting to do so when it is your turn to play. Keep pace with the group in front of you and do not worry about where the group behind you is. If a group is out of position, an SCGA official will monitor and time them. Any group out of position will be informed by an SCGA official when they are being monitored and timed.

A group will be considered out of position if it reaches the tee of a par-3 hole and the preceding group has cleared the next tee; reaches the tee of a par-4 hole and the putting green is clear; or reaches the tee of a par-5 hole when the preceding group is on the putting green.

When a group is out of position each player in the group is expected to play any stroke within 40 seconds after timing of the player's stroke begins. Other than on the putting green, timing of a player's stroke will begin when he has had reasonable opportunity to reach his ball, it is his turn to play and he can play without interference or distraction. Time spent determining yardage will count as part of the time taken for the next stroke. On the putting green, timing will begin after a player has been allowed a reasonable amount of time to lift, clean and replace his ball, repair his ball mark and other ball marks on his line of putt and remove loose impediments from his line of putt. Time spent looking at the line from beyond the hole and / or behind the ball will count as part of the time taken for the next stroke.

PACE OF PLAY PENALTIES: One bad time exceeding the allotted time – Warning. A second bad time – 1 stroke penalty. A third bad time – Additional 2 stroke penalty. A fourth bad time – Disqualification

COACHING RULES – RULE 24.4

The coach(es) may provide instruction, encouragement and information to his/her golfers without interfering with play or the conduct of the event under the following regulations:

- Each high school with a team entered in the event is allowed to appoint two (2) coaches who may communicate advice.
- Each high school with one or more individuals entered in the event is allowed to appoint one (1) coach who may communicate advice.
- Between the play of holes, a coach is allowed to communicate advice to his/her players.
 - Between the play of holes is defined as starting when the player has completed play of the hole and ending when the player places the ball on the tee on the next hole. Coaches may not be on the putting green or on the teeing ground while communicating with their players.
- The communication of advice may not impede the pace of play.
- Coaches are NOT allowed to communicate any advice (verbal or non-verbal) during the play of the hole. A violation of this would result in the player being penalized under Rule 10.2 of the Rules of Golf.
- Coaches who are in violation of this policy are subject to the following consequences:
 - 1st Breach: Warning
 - Subsequent Breach: Removal from the golf course (coach must remain in the clubhouse/practice area)
- The golf coach(es) as specified under Bylaw 503 (E,F) must be listed on file at his/her respective high school as the golf coach or an employee of the high school or school district in order to communicate advice to his/her players.
- The golf coach(es) must complete the appropriate form in the event handbook and sign in at the event with the tournament committee to receive their credentials and be authorized to coach. The CIF will provide the credentials.
- As a reminder, players are still prohibited from communicating advice, as defined by Rule 10.2, to other players at any time during their round. Any player who gives or asks for advice will be penalized according to Rule 10.2 of the Rules of Golf.

Any head coach, assistant coach, or school employee who is found to be in violation of the regulations outlined above may be denied entry at future CIF championship events and may cause his/her team or individual players to be disqualified from the event. Any issues relating to the Rules of Golf (penalty strokes or disqualification) will be determined by the NCGA/SCGA in conjunction with the CIF. Any decisions regarding removal or suspensions will be determined by the CIF. The decision rendered will be considered final.

APPENDIX B

Guidelines for a Playoff

When a playoff occurs, the qualifying spot will be determined by starting on a hole that will be determined by the SCGA and the CIF. When the ninth qualifying spot is determined through the playoff, the remaining players that were still in the playoff will be involved in a card off of their stipulated round to determine Alternate #1 and Alternate #2. To be involved in the card off, the remaining individuals had to be tied for second place on the last hole played behind the winner of the playoff.

It is the intent of the CIF to attempt to always have a playoff to determine the nine individuals that will qualify from the regional finals to the state finals. There are situations where this might not be possible. Inclement weather, darkness or an unforeseen situation could affect the status of a playoff after the stipulated round is completed.

Therefore, if the above situation occurs in a regional final, and it is determined by the CIF and the SCGA that a playoff cannot take place, the following method will be used to determine the ninth qualifying spot for the individual play:

A card off will take place for the individuals tied for the remaining qualifying spot(s). The USGA recommended tie breaking procedure will be used. The first criteria are the total scores for holes 10-18 for each individual. If there is still a tie, the scores from 13-18 are added. If a tie still exists, then holes 16-18 are used. If a tie still exists, then hole 18 is used. The winner(s) of the card off will advance to the state tournament. The remaining individuals will be placed as Alternate #1 and Alternate #2 (based on card off) in case any of the individuals cannot participate on the day of the state finals. Note: If after this procedure, they are still tied, the same procedure will be used with holes 1-9. Holes 10-18 are the holes as noted on the scorecard, regardless of the hole that each player started their play.

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
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
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
